THE CONFITEOR: I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do,

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father.

We pray for Catholic believers, that the opening of the Jubilee Year on Christmas Eve will call us to set out afresh as pilgrims of hope in our shadowed world. (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord

We pray for women of spirit like Mary and Elizabeth, that their bold belief in God's saving power will inspire young and old alike to lives of daring faith. (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord

We pray for those who carry grief in their hearts at this time of the year, that whatever sorrow afflicts them they will be comforted by the love of friends and the embrace of the community. (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord

We pray for our Diocese, on the path to the Diocesan Assembly. *May we bring Good news to our needy world, as wind and fire for one another.* (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord

We pray for those who have died recently, , and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time, that they will be led by the Good Shepherd to the banquet of eternal life. (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord.

<u>CELEBRANT:</u> Faithful God, from the dawn of time you have watched over your people. Be with us always on our way through the seasons of our lives. We ask this through Christ, our Lord.

REFLECTION: It has been claimed that, except for some sincerely religious people, Christmas has become an occasion of dusty sentimentality – something pretty, yet not quite authentic. There is more than a little truth in this. Many people who all year long scarcely give Jesus' teachings a thought – much less live by them – at Christmas time wallow in cheap and sentimental piety. We need to be careful not to fall into the same trap. Mary, who is at the centre of today's Gospel, will help us. She is a great model. No sooner does she say her "Yes" to God, than she hurries to her cousin Elizabeth. Mary's religion was not merely sentimental. It was the expression of a genuine feeling, which she converted into deeds. By all means, let us light candles for our children and sing carols. But let us not be content with mere pious sentimentality.

Let us pray: Lord, help us to demand more of ourselves. If it's true that only love can redeem us, then help us, Lord, to let our love be real, and not confine it to one day in the year.

THE PROCESSION OF THE GIFTS: It would work well if the Commentator, at each weekend Mass, could, before Mass, seek two people to bring forward the Offertory Gifts of bread and wine. They can process to the altar with the gifts and with the collectors when they have finished their task and are bringing forward the people's monetary offering. Those carrying the bread and wine ought bring it up to the side of the altar, standing close to the altar, and stand there while the celebrant takes each gift and says the two "Blessed are you Lord God of all creation....." prayers. When they have been said, they bow with the celebrant tto the altar, and then return to their seats.

Lighting the Advent Candle the Fourth Sunday of Advent Christ our Light brings about change in us:

The first candle is the candle of Love. The second candle is the candle of Hope. The third candle is the candle of Joy. The fourth is the candle of Peace. We light a fourth candle because Jesus makes peace between God and us so that we may live in the sight of God's presence. The candles are now lit.

PILGRIMS OF HOPE: In 2025 Pope Francis has proclaimed a Year of Jubilee. The theme for the year is 'Pilgrims of Hope'. Join us as we celebrate the opening of this year-long journey of hope and faith at St Mary's Cathedral, Sale, on 1st Jan 2025. This day is also the feast of Mary, Mother of God, patron of our Diocese. The Holy See also commemorates World Day of Peace this day. The Mass, celebrated by Bishop Greg, will begin at 11:00am and all are welcome. Following the Mass, light refreshments will be available. There will be an opportunity for you to pray and reflect on the Diocesan themes for the year as well as considering how we can all be pilgrims of hope in 2025.

DIOCESAN CONSULTATION PROCESS 2024: The final question parishioners were asked to think about in the Consultation Day process was: What are the specific issues and actions WE would like the Diocesan Assembly in February 2025 to consider looking forward through the next five years?

The response from our group of parishioners follows:

- Acknowledge the passion hope instils in a community and stress the importance of community in finding ways to promote and share faith. Inspire by example.
- Empower individual parishes to engage in community consultation to listen to what the personal/ individual/ collective needs are. How can we strengthen/ improve existing faith groups to promote individual spirituality?
- Attempt to address the role /impact of technology on the human spirit.
- Specific Pastoral Issues: aging population, diminishing mass-going numbers, difficulty of engaging young people in active faith.
- To promote "renewed life and shared mission": -Encourage care of elderly parishioners so that love in action is visible. Promote the "mini Vinnies" movement so that young people may experience the joy of good works. Encourage prayer for peace.
- More emphasis on establishing prayer groups to discuss and deepen our faith. Make more effort to engage young and old together in our communities.
- We would emphasise listening to others and their needs, leading to supporting and affirming actions.
- Prayerfulness, reflection, growth in understanding of the work of God in our lives for the future.
- Using the rituals of today that can be understood by the people of the times not of the past. Use language that speaks to people today and meets their needs. Such change will not be without cost to some and must be approached with compassion.
- Develop our strengths of mission and discipleship. Look at ways to tap into the goodness and generosity of so many. Help us to find ways to develop in relationship with Jesus .

OUR DELEGATES TO THE DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY: Many thanks indeed to Lucy O'C, Chris L and Genevieve McC who have accepted nomination to represent our parish at the Diocesan Assembly in Feb. We can all be very grateful to them. It became necessary to find another venue for the Assembly, the challenges of staging such an event at Marist Sion College were becoming too great. So, Bishop Greg made the decision that we will assemble at Fed Uni, Churchill instead. It will be a much better facility for such a gathering.

ON ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS: Someone commented recently that it would be much easier if Christmas was celebrated on the Sunday, every year! We can understand why. The liturgical calendar is always rather crowded around this time, but it becomes even more complicated when Christmas falls on a Saturday or a Monday because that makes two holy days of obligation in a row.

Scholars have come up with several reasons for 25th December being chosen as the date for the celebration of Christ's birth, but none of these would seem to have any stronger a case than the suggestion of fixing the time for the celebration of Christmas as the last Sunday of the calendar year, say.

But this emphasis on Christmas Day is really not being true to the origins and long traditions of this feast. Since early times Christians celebrated Christmas as a season, not just a day. In the church calendar today Christmas Time is the period from 25th December until the feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

From the beginning, the readings and prayers for the season expressed the Church's understanding that Christmas is more than a commemoration of Jesus' birthday. It is rather the celebration of the beginnings of the mystery of salvation – of Christ's birth, revelation to the Jewish shepherds and the Gentile magi, baptism by John in the Jordan and first miracle – the changing of water into wine at the wedding feast in Cana.

Christmas has its own octave during which the feasts of St Stephen, St John and the Holy Innocents are celebrated. These saints are seen as having a particular relation to the Christmas mystery and are traditionally honoured as 'companions of Christ'.

The Sunday within the Christmas octave is celebrated as the feast of the Holy Family. On that date we celebrate the solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, a feast which highlights the role of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the incarnation and manifestation of the Saviour.

<u>CARITAS' VANUATU EARTHQUAKE APPEAL:</u> Our neighbour in the Pacific, Vanuatu, has experienced two earthquakes within 24 hours impacting over 116,000 people and causing significant damage to buildings and infrastructure. GOSPEL: (Luke 1:39-44)


